Training

2023 was another great year for first aid training for St. John Ambulance New Brunswick. Our annual statistics saw us train over 17,000 residents of the province in essential life-saving first aid skills.

2023 also saw the implementation of pre-covid first aid training practices. We continue be vigilant and slowly introduce practicing first aid with partners when participants are comfortable to do so.

Training

SPINAL IMMOBILIZATION & TRANSPORTATION

In 2023 a major client requested that we develop a new course that teaches how to move a casualty from a remote location that is inaccessible to EMS. In 2023, we taught 5 classes and trained 50 participants in this vital course.

OPIOID POISONING RESPONSE TRAINING

In response to the rising number of opioid poisonings across Canada since the emergence of COVID-19, St. John Ambulance is working with Employment and Social Development Canada and Health Canada to provide nasal Naloxone training and kits to the participants. In 2023, we provided this free training to 349 participants.

INSTRUCTOR DEVELOPMENT

We scheduled 6 Instructor
Development Programs in 2023 and
had 46 participants complete the
training. Courses were held in
Fredericton, Saint John, and
Moncton.

SJA NB reviewed processes for instructor recruitment and instructor onboarding.



LAW ENFORCEMENT FIRST AID

The Department of Public Safety wants all officers and peace officers within their department to have SJA'S LEFA training. In 2023, we scheduled 5 LEFA classes and trained 54 participants, which was double the amount trained the previous year and we expect this number to grow as we move forward.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE PROGRAM

The Emergency Response Unit continued to grow and established three satellite stations across New Brunswick to aid in a faster response time.





INSTUCTOR VOLUNTEERS

9 of our Instructors volunteered 236 hours of course instruction within our community. This includes teaching other Volunteers First Aid Courses and Volunteering their time to teach for other organizations in their communities.

YOUTH PROGRAM

The Fredericton Youth Unit remained active in their community, volunteering to help at our Therapy Dog Evaluations and Community Events. Recruitment for more youth members is ongoing as the older members become MFR certified and start their transition over to the Adult Unit. In 2023 3 Youth Members became MFR Certified and began apprenticing at Community Events with Adult Members.

Raymond Doucet swam out to rescue a man who had fallen into a river and lost consciousness in Quarryville, NB on July 2nd, 2022. Once he had returned to shore with the casualty, Jamie and Isabelle performed CPR until the man regained consciousness.

Raymond received a Gold Life-Saving Award (Risk of Life) and Jamie and Isabelle were presented Silver Life-Saving Awards.

Dylan Fraelic (above left), an off-duty Oromocto Volunteer Firefighter, used first aid to save the life of a casualty who was pinned to curb by a jeep in August 2022 in Oromocto, NB. Dylan received a Gold Life-Saving Award (Risk of Life) for his life-saving intervention.

Robert Rogers and Derrick McLellan (above middle and right), worked with others to respond when a casualty collapsed playing hockey in Nackawic, NB on January 18th, 2023. They performed CPR and used an AED on the casualty and their actions resulted in the man's life being saved.

Lily Smallwood (below left), performed CPR when her mother collapsed on September 27th, 2021 and her actions saved her mother's life.

Marco Moeini and Minji Kim (below middle and right), St. John Ambulance Medical First Responder volunteers provided first aid on a casualty who was repeatedly losing consciousness during the East Coast Classic North American Softball Championship in July 2022.







AEDs Save Lives



In 2023 SJA NB sold 40 AEDs.

This included 19 Stryker Heartsine devices and 20 Stryker CR2 units.

We also sold 1 Zoll defibrillator.

Sales of AEDs and accessories totaled \$94,548.43 for 2023.
